Hand-Made Willow Furniture

THE right kind of willow furniture affords so exactly the relief that is necessary to lighten the general effect of the darker and heavier oak furniture, that we have come to believe that a room to be satisfactorily furnished should have one or two pieces. Especially is it desirable in combination with our plain oak furniture, as in its way it is as simple in line and as natural in finish as the more severe and massive oaken chairs and settles. As these are designed with a view to revealing the essential quality of the oak and of giving full value to its individuality of grain, texture and color, so the willow furniture is designed with the idea in view of showing the weaving of slender, flexible withes into basket work. All these chairs, while strongly and firmly made, have yet the flexibility of a well-woven basket-a peculiarity which adds greatly to their attractiveness. They are shaped as carefully with regard to the comfort of the user as are the big CRAFTS-MAN chairs of wood and leather, and they have the additional advantage of being very light and easily moved.

We finish these willow chairs in two colors—green and brown. The green has very much the appearance of fresh young withes of willow as they look when the sap first begins to flow in the spring. The brown is more of







a golden-brown tone, such as might be seen later in the season. In both cases the color is more or less uneven, varying as it might in the branches themselves. All these pieces are hand made, so that in workmanship they have the delightful human quality of a little irregularity, an effect which is heightened by the method of finishing just described.

The loose cushions can be covered with CRAFTSMAN canvas in tones of wood brown, dull, soft yellow or graygreen, but of course these coverings could be varied to suit any scheme of furnishing. The chairs are exceedingly attractive when the cushions are covered with a more lustrous material in shades of golden brown or forest green, with designs carried out in some brilliantly contrasting color. For a summer cottage or a bungalow, the cushions might be covered with chintz or cretonne, or a material which we call Pompeiian cloth—a cotton fabric woven in two tones of leaf-green, with a loose strand of the darker tone that gives somewhat the effect of couching done in short, irregular lines. In fact, there is no end to the possibilities of these willow chairs when they are skilfully used to give the lighter and more decorative touches to the furnishings of a room.
